The news from Labore, which we extract from the Agra Ukhhar, is of the highest importance as it is highly probable that the British unny will he soon called on to interfere. It appears that Shere Bingh having induced the troops outside the city of Labore to join his standard, commenced an attack with a determination to remove the Rance Chund Konar, mother of Now Nebal Singhfrom the throne. The city gates were suddenly ordered to be closed on the evening of the 14th of I mury ; gins were planted at them, and no persons were allowed to approach the walls from the outside. On the 15th nothing was decided ; but during the night some of Shere Singh's partisans having entered one of the gates, that chief succeeded in establishing himself in the city where he held a durbar.

The tort sall held out for the Rance, and continued to fire upon the adherents of Ahere Singh. The contest, which it was at first thought would spee filly terminate in favor of the available was continued up to the date of the latest intel. ligence.
